

The recipients of the 2012 Air Force Outstanding Unit Award were announced by Air Force Lt. Gen. Harry M. Wyatt III, director of the Air National Guard, on Jan. 16. Among the recipients were the New Orleans-based 159th Fighter Wing.

According to the Air Force Personnel Center, the award is granted annually by the secretary of the Air Force to units that have gained distinction through exceptionally meritorious service or "outstanding achievement that clearly sets the unit above and apart from similar units."

Federal, state & local agencies conduct joint training in St. Tammany and St. Landry parishes

NEW ORLEANS – The Louisiana National Guard joined federal, state and local partner agencies in the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness disaster training exercise at Fontainebleau State Park in St. Tammany Parish and the Grand Prairie Rest Area in St. Landry Parish on March 23.

The training exercise provided all partner agencies with the opportunity to conduct joint all-hazards disaster response operations in a controlled environment in advance of the 2013 hurricane season.

"The National Guard is ready for this coming hurricane season. The exercise this week tests our [LANG's] readiness to respond to any emergency. By working closely with all of our partner agencies at the state, federal and local levels, we've been able to stress our response plans to ensure that our systems, personnel and equipment are ready for hurricane season," said Maj. Gen. Glenn H. Curtis, adjutant general of the LANG. "Our citizens place great faith in all of us to do what we train to do ... for our Guardsmen along with the other state and local emergency responders to be ready to protect them and their property in times of emergency."

The featured training lanes included land and water search and rescue, helicopter medical evacuation, interoperability of communications systems, site security and commodities distribution.





"You get to know what everybody's capabilities are and how you share resources as a team. For example, the Guard has a footprint on just about everything going on in every parish and throughout the state - you have people affiliated with all the state's ESFs [Emergency Support Functions]."

Louisiana's Recruit **Sustainment Program** hosts Warrior Challenge

Louisiana Army National Guard trainees from across the state vied for top honors in the Recruit Sustainment Program Warrior Challenge competition at Camp Villere in Slidell in early February.

RSP is a program for new recruits to help prepare them for initial training, said 1st Sqt. John S. Mattison, Louisiana RSP noncommissioned officer in charge. It gets them being around the military environment, and it gets them administratively correct as well as physically more prepared.

Pvt. 1st Class Braxton Henry and Pvt. 1st Class Trenton Miguez from RSP Detachment 5 in Lafayette won the competition, which consisted of a physical fitness test, road march. obstacle course, weapon qualification, land navigation, and an oral board. Each of eight RSP detachments throughout the state sent a team of two competitors and an alternate.





NEW ORLEANS – Female Airmen with the Louisiana Air National Guard participated in the first-of-its-kind Women's Forum in which females had the opportunity to hear from mentors and to speak openly about the unique challenges faced by women in the military during an event held at the historic Jackson Barracks Museum, Jan. 13.

"This forum is for you," said Chief Master Sgt. Nicole Roper, 214th Engineer Installation Squadron, who spearheaded the effort. The idea came to her after an invaluable Yellow Ribbon Training class where she was able to share unique experiences with a fellow female Airman.

"I am not special," said guest speaker Brig. Gen. Joanne Sheridan, who is the first female to ascend to the rank of general in the Louisiana National Guard. "I may wear a star, but I am just like the rest of you."

Sheridan shared personal experiences with the attentive crowd of more than 100 female Airmen about her career progression and gave advice on ways to be successful.

"The biggest challenge any of us face is learning to balance our careers and families," said Sheridan. "The military lays out a great path for you to be successful – you just need to find

balance and follow that path."

Sheridan encouraged the women to follow military regulations, get a trusted battle buddy, to always act in a professional manner, to treat all Soldiers and Airmen the same, to not

procrastinate, to accept tough assignments and to exude self confidence.

"Do all of these things and you may or may not become a general, but you will end up being the best possible version of yourself," she said.

"I am so proud of all of you," said Col. Romie Galloway, 159th Support Group commander and currently the only female colonel in the Air National Guard. "The more I talk to you, the more amazed I am by you and honestly the more humble I am to be serving with you."

Galloway advised the Airmen that as females they are always under a spotlight. "You want to be judged by how you perform your job. You don't want to be judged by what you did while on TDY or what you wore to the wing social."

The Airmen were allowed to ask questions of the panel of quest speakers and to voice their unique concerns. Several issues were brought to light, and Airmen left feeling confident that their concerns would be addressed and resolved in the near future.

"I loved this forum," said Senior Airman Erinne M. Smith, 159th Maintenance Squadron structural maintainer, "It's great to see and hear from so many women in leadership positions. I am looking forward to developing more personal relationships with some of the women who spoke here today and to just see how it is that they got to those positions."

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

Air Guard makes life-saving contribution

Louisiana Airmen donate blood to help fellow wingman's son battling leukemia

BELLE CHASSE - Airmen with the Louisiana Air National Guard's 159th Fighter Wing heeded a call to action by donating much-needed blood to be used during multiple blood transfusions for a young boy's battle with leukemia. The blood was donated during a drill weekend blood drive held at Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base, New Orleans, Jan. 12.

The day's mission: to collect at least 50 units of blood for 4-year-old Darrell "DJ" Lanus II, son of Master Sgt. Darrell Lanus, 159th Maintenance Group, and his wife Sandra. DJ is currently being treated for leukemia at Children's Hospital, New Orleans.

According to the Blood Center's Westbank Donor Center, there are currently 1,100 kids in various cancer treatment stages at Children's Hospital. In 2011, the Blood Center provided over 14,000 blood components for those kids.

Airmen responded in swarms to the call to action for this young member of the 159th FW family. Some had donated blood on a regular basis. Others had never donated but felt compelled to do so under these circumstances. By the end of the day, the Airmen had exceeded their donation goal by totaling 59 units of donated blood.

"I don't personally know this family, but he (DJ) is a baby, and I just wanted to help out somehow," said Senior Airman Cydney J. Young, 159th Maintenance Squadron structural repair journeyman. The New Orleans native said that the blood donation stick hurt a little, but she would do it again in a heartbeat.

DJ was diagnosed with leukemia, or AML, a blood cancer, on Nov. 7, 2012. AML starts in the bone marrow, but in most cases it quickly moves into the blood. It can sometimes spread



to other parts of the body including the lymph nodes, liver, spleen, central nervous system and testicles (in males). DJ's treatment will be ongoing at Children's Hospital over the next six to eight months. Besides chemo-

therapy, blood transfusions will be an ongoing vital part of his treatment.

"This is definitely a worthwhile cause," said Master Sgt. Michael Vaurigaud, 159th Command Post controller. "DJ is



the family member of one of our own. We always talk about the importance of family... this is the time we need to step up and help our Guard family."

While planning for the tournament and choosing sponsors, Wilson decided that selecting the LANG was the right choice.


"We thought it would be a perfect fit," Wilson said. "These athletes are disciplined and have a strong work ethic, much like the National Guard."


Noncommissioned officers from the LANG's Recruiting and Retention Command were on hand to assist the tournament officials as well as cheer on the schools where they recruit.

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

both St. Tammany and St. Landry parishes were the land and water search and rescue simulations performed by the LANG and the La. Dept. of Wildlife and Fisheries, the state's lead agency for all search and rescue operations.

Lt. Col. Dallas Jones, Search and Rescue coordinator for LANG's State Aviation Command, described how the La. Dept. of Wildlife and Fisheries uses the Guard's aviation assets to exponentially enhance its critical mission.

"In the event of an emergency, we'll assist Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries to initiate search and rescue operations using their boat crews and our UH-72 assets," Jones said. "We bring a helicopter that is basically a communications package with eight different radios that talks to all the agencies that are doing search and rescue, in addition to providing real-time video footage to agents with hand-held receivers on the ground."


This type of interagency cooperation requires hands-on training and rehearsal. According to St. Tammany Parish's Accardo, the development of the kinds of relationships that build trust and reliability such as he's experienced working with the LANG is crucial.

"Our relationship with the Guard is excellent because we work as one team. I believe I heard the TAG [Mai. Gen. Glenn H. Curtis, adjutant general, LANG] say in an earlier planning meeting that this is what it's all about - showing how we all have the capabilities to work as one team in a crisis situation," said Accardo.


An official observer from "big" Army, Maj. Gen. Charles H. Gailes, Alabama Guardsman and commander, Contingency Command Post (Task Force 51), U.S. Army North at Fort Sam Houston. Texas, was impressed by the level of preparedness he observed in the LANG and its partner agencies.

"You all are the heavy lifters for your state, very skilled, very well resourced agency that can move in and take on almost any task that a state needs to serve their people," said Gailes. "Louisiana's got it ... the ability of the National Guard to integrate with its partners both at the local level, the parish level here and at the state level. Everybody understands what the requirements are, what the capabilities are, and that everybody's main concern, number one main priority - it's not about money, it's not about who does what - is serving our citizens.

Curtis said, "We have a lot of veterans in here, and if you're a young Soldier or a family member


of a young Soldier who has not deployed yet, those Soldiers will take care of you."
